

Civil society involvement at the UN level: Does it work?

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A (very) Brief History of CSI in Vienna

1946: The Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) established

1954: 6 NGO representatives attended the 9th CND

1984: 28 NGO representatives attended the 43rd CND

1998: UNGASS provided new levels of CS access

2006: First resolution on civil society participation (49/2)

2008: "Beyond 2008" initiative with 300 NGO representatives

2014: Civil Society Task Force (CSTF) launched for the UNGASS

2016: 11 CS speakers, and "contributions" from around 60 NGOs

2017: 197 NGO representatives attended the 60th CND



The Vienna NGO Committee

- VNGOC was established in 1983
- Links NGOs with the Vienna-based drug control agencies
- Open to all NGOs currently around 190 members
- Broad spectrum of views and experiences
- Supports engagement in Vienna
- Organises "informal dialogues" with key figures



The Current Situation in Vienna

- Vast improvement in CSI and appreciation of civil society
- Participation to all ECOSOC-registered NGOs
- NGOs are "observers" but can:
 - Attend all 'public' meetings (but not "informals")
 - Make oral interventions in the main session
 - Organise and participate in side events
 - Submit written and video contributions



Remaining Challenges

- Some governments remain wary of civil society
- Tensions re: "the Vienna consensus" and naming countries
- Increasing reliance on closed "informal" negotiations
- No financial support for participation
- Often there is also a lack of capacity to engage



CSI in Vienna: Does it work?


- Unquestionable shift in narrative over past decade
- 1998 UNGASS: CS groups lobby successfully against SCOPE (Strategy for Coca and Opium Poppy Elimination)
- Beyond 2008: Remains a pivotal moment and document
- 2016 (VNGOC and NYNGOC):
 CS presence at the meeting was widely felt and the outcome was progressive
- 2018: "If you look at the delegates faces, it really touched us"

The Civil Society Task Force

- Building on UNGASS 2016
- Focused on "Ministerial Segment" in March 2019
- Joint initiative of VNGOC and NYNGOC
- 35 representatives, selected through open calls:
 - 18 regional representatives from 9 regions
 - 5 representatives of "affected populations"
 - 5 representatives of "global issues"
 - 7 person Steering Committee





The Civil Society Task Force

- Advocacy for meaningful CSI for March 2019
- Speaker selection for CND and related meetings
 - Mandated by CND Resolution 61/10
- Global online civil society consultation
 - Results launched in December 2018
 - Position paper to be submitted in early 2019
- Civil Society Hearings in New York and Vienna
